Amazon workers' strike

On Monday, the 22nd, the employees from Amazon Italy went on strike as part of the first protest of the entire logistics division within the American giant for better work conditions in an economic context that was marked by the Coronavirus Pandemic.

The unions estimate that Amazon's delivery systems are based on about 40,000 employees, including the staff of the logistics division, which represents the majority of long-term employees in Italy (9,500 people).

Turkish Women fight for their rights

On Friday 19th, the Turkish government withdrew from the treaty made to adopt a legislation, which would have reprimanded domestic violence and other abuses, including conjugal rape and female genital mutilation. They immediately saw a massive change in the population's actions.

Millions of women, despite the pandemic, have protested Saturday in Turkey demanding the president Recep Tayyip Erdogan reconsider his choice on the treaty for the fight against the violence on women.

In the night from Friday to Saturday, the head of the Turkish government announced that Turkey wouldn't be a part of the Istanbul Convention, first international decree published to fix the judicial restrictive norms in approximately thirty countries to prevent sexist violence, and which restricts government to adopt a legislation reprimanding the violence towards women.
